Home Work Tips:

Children are more successful in school when parents or guardians take an active interest in their homework — it shows children that what they do is important.

Of course, helping with homework shouldn't mean spending hours hunched over a desk. Parents or Guardians can be supportive by demonstrating study and organization skills, explaining a tricky problem, or just encouraging kids to take a break. And who knows? Parents might even learn a thing or two!

Here are some tips to guide the way:

- 1. **Get to know the teachers and what they're looking for.** Attend school events, such as Parent-Teachers Association (PTA) meetings to meet your child's teachers. Ask about the homework policies and how you should be involved.
- 2. **Set up a homework-friendly area at home.** Make sure children have a well-lit place to complete homework. Keep supplies paper, pencils, glue, scissors within reach.
- 3. Schedule a regular study time. Some children work best in the afternoon, following a snack and play period; others may prefer to wait until after dinner.
- 4. **Help them make a plan.** On heavy homework nights or when there's an especially hefty assignment to tackle, encourage your child to break up the work into manageable chunks. Create a work schedule for the night if necessary and take time for a 15-minute break every hour, if possible.
- 5. **Keep distractions to a minimum.** This means no TV, loud music, games or phone calls. (Occasionally, though, a phone call to a classmate about an assignment can be helpful.)
- 6. **Make sure kids do their own work.** They won't learn if they don't think for themselves and make their own mistakes. Parents can make suggestions and help with directions. But it's a child's job to do the learning.
- 7. **Be a motivator and monitor.** Ask about assignments, quizzes, and tests. Give encouragement, check completed homework, and make yourself available for questions and concerns.
- 8. **Set a good example.** Do your kids ever see you diligently balancing your budget or reading a book? Kids are more likely to follow their parents' or guardians' examples than their advice.
- 9. **Praise their work and efforts.** Post a test that they did well or an art project on the refrigerator. Mention academic achievements to relatives.
- 10.**If there are continuing problems with homework, get help.** Talk about it with your child's teacher. Some kids have trouble seeing the board and may need glasses; others might need an evaluation for a learning problem or attention disorder.
